

We also participate in an annual event called the DC Fly-In, sponsored by the ACSA. Because we recreate on Federal lands, we must have our ear to the ground where legislation happens at a National level. We do the same thing in Washington DC that we do in Olympia! ACSA is our ears in DC, at the U.S. Forest Service and other places that impact the snowmobiler. WSSA collects this information all year long and then in March or April goes to the DC Fly-In. Appointments have been made by ACSA to meet with our federal legislators concerning the problems that have come up. After two days of meetings to prepare us, we then go off to the Capitol. Snowmobilers are definitely impacted at the National level and then it flows downhill to the state. It is important we continue to support the snowmobiler by attending these events. It takes money and volunteers to get this job done. You may consider getting involved this way for our user group. WSSA will continue to the best they can with your understanding and support.

WSSA is still in the business of 'Keeping the Gates Open' for the

snowmobilers in Washington State. Please volunteer your time and talents so that we may have success for you.

Snowmobile Program Register your snowmobile and receive a FREE

Sno-Park permit. Relax and enjoy this winter season without risk of a citation for not being registered or for not having a Sno-Park permit.

Your \$50 registration fee and money collected from a gas tax refund are put into a dedicated fund account for the Snowmobile Program.

The gas tax refund is computed using the following formula: 135 gallons (average yearly fuel usage per snowmobile) x .349 cents per gallon of gas x the annual number of registered snowmobiles and snowbikes.



The gas tax refund and registration fees collected each year add up to approximately \$94.20 per snowmobile or snowbike to fund the program. Fees collected this year are put towards next year's snowmobile season to pay for trail grooming, snow removal, sanitation, administration, education and enforcement.

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2024 WSSA Scholarship

The Washington State Snowmobile Association will be offering a scholarship to either a graduating high school senior or a person currently enrolled in college. This will be a \$1,000 scholarship and will be given to the winner regardless of other scholarships or grants the student may be awarded. If awarded this scholarship, the funds will be forwarded to the named school after proof of registration is received. An alternate will be picked if the winner should decide not to enroll in college.

Requirements are as follows:

- The applicant must be a member of the Washington State Snowmobile Association, either by a family membership, or as an individual member.
- The applicant must submit the completed WSSA Scholarship application form.
- The applicant must submit a resume detailing their involvement in snowmobiling, as well as any other extra-curricular activities.
- The applicant must submit their essay based on the 'essay challenge' on the application form. The essay should be a minimum of two pages, 12-point, double-spaced and typed. Keep in mind, a well-researched, comprehensive essay, will undoubtedly be significantly longer and we certainly encourage that.
- All tasks on the application form must be completed or it will be rejected.
- The application must be received by the WSSA Scholarship Chair no later than March 15th, 2024, either by e-mail, or regular mail.


2024 Essay Topic:

- How do you prepare yourself when planning to ride in an unfamiliar area which is outside of your normal riding area?
- How would you advise someone else to prepare to ride in your area which is outside of their normal riding area?

I said yes they can and explained that a nonmotorized sno-park permit does not help with our grooming and sno-park clearing but motorized permits do; they also cost the same. The vendor has said next year they are going to be selling motorized sno-park permits for skiers and bicycles. The reason this could work in the Methow is because our snowmobile sno-parks get so much use by backcountry skiers and cross-country skiers. I plan on having this same discussion with all vendors in the Methow. I know this is not going to work everywhere but it is a start to help with our shortage of funding. Maybe?





WSSA's Winthrop Winter Rendezvous was a hit!



We had a great ride, did a bit of off-trail as well, and enjoyed lunch served up by the Butte Busters. Weather was a mix of sun and clouds, but we were certainly lacking snow. But we weren't riding dirt and the trails were groomed very well! I later talked to friends who went on the other rides and they all had great times as well; it sounds like the Hwy 20 ride was likely the best in regards to views; will need to do that one day!

Friday night at The Barn was a pulledpork and brats barbecue dinner served up by BS BBQ. I'm not a huge pulled-pork fan, but everything was tasty and nobody went away hungry. I had to force myself to eat the deserts. (Yeah, sure!) For fun after dinner, teams were formed and we had a snowmobile trivia contest. Yeah, our table didn't win. But we didn't do the worst! That's a win, right?!

The big event for Saturday was the MVSA Bucket Run. This is the first time (in my 20 years anyway) an event like this has been incorporated into Rendezvous, but it isn't the first time my daughter and I have ridden this event on Rendezvous weekend. Our first time riding it was when we were at 12 Tribes Casino in Omak for Rendezvous. A couple/few years later we again joined the MVSA club for their Bucket Run when Rendezvous was in Chelan. And that year there were several other Rendezvous participants who also came up for the event. It has always been a fun time.

Knowing how packed the sno-park can get, we decided to get an early start and it paid off. They basically park you nose to tail so once in, you aren't leaving until there is room to snake your way out. We were at the front row for a quick escape if needed. (It wasn't.) The only downside to arriving early (around 8am) was the course didn't open until 10am. I'll admit I thought we'd be leaving around 9am, but we just hung

with our group and waited. The weather was nice, so it wasn't a big deal, and it seems there is always somebody in the group tinkering on their sled anyway, and there was no exception on this day.

While waiting to launch, a few people asked if they could join our group as they were uncertain of the way to go. They were more than welcome, but did they understand I didn't really know either? While my daughter and I rode from this sno-park the last time we participated, I didn't remember the exact route, and due to the limited snow, the course had been rerouted for this event anyway. But hey, I can follow signs with the best of them! When we finally blasted up the trail, our group of six had swelled to about three times that many.

The route changed from a loop to an up-and-back event. What was initially confusing was we didn't know where checkpoint one was located. When we came up on the first checkpoint, we were quickly flagged by and continued up the trail. When we reached the next checkpoint, I didn't understand the signals I was getting, so I stopped and talked to someone. They said to keep going up to the end, which was Sweetgrass Butte. But that wasn't quite right... as we came up on the next checkpoint, we were waved down and it turned out this was the first checkpoint. Then we went up to Sweetgrass where there is a warming hut, and this was the second checkpoint. We hung around Sweetgrass for awhile and enjoyed the 360-degree view from the top of the butte. Back on the trail we hit the other two checkpoints we'd passed before arriving back in the sno-park for the final checkpoint. A couple of interesting notes: They had warm fires burning at the checkpoints, along with home-baked cookies for the taking! Our group enjoyed both! The final checkpoint, instead of drawing a card, you actually throw a dart at cards; this adds a touch of skill to what is typically an event of pure luck.

The MVSA Bucket Run has always had great prizes. But they outdid themselves this year! The grand prize was a North Cascades sled deck. Wow! Sadly, we didn't win it. Nor any of the other great prizes. As usual, we were just making donations to the club.

U.S. Forest Service releases final snowmobile plan for North Idaho - It's a loss for snowmobilers

Let me start out by saying this is commentary on my part. But I'm guessing my views will be shared by many of you. I recently read an article in The Spokesman-Review noting the final Kaniksu Over-Snow Vehicle Use Designation Project (Plan) has been released. This document is designed to be the outline of how the agency will manage motorized winter recreation on roughly one-million acres of public lands in North Idaho. The document covers the Bonners Ferry, Priest Lake and Sandpoint Ranger Districts of the Idaho Panhandle National Forest. A piece of the Coeur d'Alene River Ranger District is included, too. (My understanding is this does affect a small part of Northern Washington as well.) The article does a pretty good job of covering the issue, but tends to gloss over our loss and focuses on a minor win.

Let's start with the win. The article states the new plan "would give riders more certainty and a little more room to play beginning next winter". "More room to play" does sound like we are gaining ground. The new plan adds about 17,000 acres to where motorized users will be allowed to ride. 17,000 acres. In a plan covering nearly one-million. Is this a win?

But the real problem is with the length of the season, specifically, a date set where off-trail travel will be limited or shut down. That's right, after a certain date each season, most of the off-trail areas will be closed to motorized users. What is the date? April 1st. The article stated riders can access more than 767,000 acres before April 1st, and after April 1st, will be limited to 141,000 acres. So that means 626,000 acres are off-limits. Living in Central Washington, we routinely ride in April. I'm pretty sure Northern Idaho is the same.

Of course I'm sure you can figure out the closure is related to conservation. In this case the party line is "this is to protect the threatened grizzly bear." Of course other species are in play; the plan keeps more than 250,000 acres off limits to protect lynx, grizzlies and wolverines.

The article further wants you to believe this was a collaborative effort, largely mirroring recommendations from the North Idaho Working Group. This group was made up of conservationists, motorized users, and others, totaling more than two dozen people. It is being called a good compromise for all involved. I'd disagree. The only group that loses in this 'compromise' is snowmobilers. We lose access, period.

But it ain't over til it's over. I'd gamble there is NO WAY this plan goes forward without a legal challenge by SOMEBODY. I'd guess snowmobilers will file a lawsuit. Probably supported and partially funded by the Idaho State Snowmobile Association. And of course the extreme environmental groups will sue saying the plan doesn't go far enough to "protect" various species, along with flora below the snow. They are already grousing about earlier closure dates, along with a minimum snow depth requirement.

When does the plan go into effect? It will happen when the Forest Service publishes a final map with the new regulations. It is expected to happen before next winter unless a judge intervenes.

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





Mountain Riding Area Committee Winter Summit 2/23/2024 West Yellowstone, Montana


The meeting started off at 9am on Friday morning. After announcements and introductions, we had a panel of quest speakers to talk to us about each of their industries and to answer questions Jason Howel had prepared in advance. Present at the table was: Dustin from Klim, Jerry from SLP, Steve from SnoWest, Allen previously from Timbersled, and Bret from Ride Rassmussen. The first question was how to get the American Council of Snowmobile Associations' (ACSA) name out there so people will know who they are and what they do for the snowmobiler. The answers were pretty much consistent: #1 social media (all platforms, including YouTube for sure), #2 print and #3 sometimes radio. The next question was concerning the importance of connecting with more clubs. There is a need to get local clubs more involved with supporting the national organizations like ACSA. To get more involved with local dealers. Dealers could have more links to the clubs to make for better communication. The consensus of the panel was the younger generation of snowmobilers (20-40) do not see the need for clubs or at least the type of clubs that have been around for the past 50 years. That said, we have our work cut out to figure out what type of club is going to work in 2024. We need to educate the younger generation and answer their question as to why we do need clubs. Communication at the grassroots level is vital

The industry participants shared their crystal ball with us, telling us of some of the future problems they see five years down the road. Noise, loss of public and private lands, and trespassing were at the top of their lists. The #1 problem was the price of snowmobiles in the future. Circling back to clubs, there is a great need for change! Clubs are boring. We need more cool attractions for the 20 to 40-year-olds. We also need to step up our avalanche educating. We need to make winter more exciting to those who are migrating up here (north). We need to use education as the tool to reach the new sledders. We need to be less redneck and more professional in our sport. We need to figure out how to modify exhaust without all the added noise! A snowbike is too loud and we need to consider some regulation to force the fix of the problem. We need to educate the snowmobilers on what is the best fit machine for them. Bigger is not always best. Too many newcomers just want the most expensive and powerful sled that money can buy.

The question was presented to the panel asking: can they help promote ACSA in their companies? The common answer was: it gets down to the dollars and their monies are better spent promoting clubs which indirectly promotes ACSA if everyone does what they are supposed to do. "Pay to play" and "popularity" is what industry focuses on in order for success. The conclusion was they can help in areas like more links to and from the clubs, dealers and ACSA. They also said we need to up our video presence on YouTube and other social platforms.

In the afternoon, all the state associations gave reports on what was happening in their areas. These reports will be included in the next Snoflyer.



State Parks Winter Recreation Program

As we enter the final stretch of the season it goes without saying this winter season has not been a good one for snow with above average temperatures and rain around a good part of the state. Even with the lack of snow, I hope everyone was able to enjoy the trails at some point this season.

SMAC Winter Meeting

The Snowmobile Advisory Committee (SMAC) winter meeting was held on January 27th in Cle Elum at the U.S. Forest Service Cle Elum Ranger District. I would like to thank the Cle Elum Ranger District for their hospitality in hosting the committee and for the use of their conference room.

Even though the weather was not great and with less than normal snow, some of the committee members were able to ride Blewett Pass on Friday while staff and another committee member toured the snoparks in the area such as Salmon la Sac, Crystal Springs, and Easton Reload

There were several items on the agenda such as groomer updates, the new State Parks website, and of course the current snowmobile registration numbers. As most are aware, with the decrease in snowmobile registrations there is also a decrease in revenue. There are hard decisions that need to be made regarding the snowmobile program and you can be sure the SMAC, along with staff, will continue to discuss and make the best decisions possible.

The SMAC funding meeting is scheduled for August 2nd-3rd, 2024, in Wenatchee.

Funding applications and the budget will be evaluated, discussed, and determined during this meeting. More information will be provided as we get closer to the summer budget meeting.

WSSA Rendezvous

I would like to send a thank you to Dee Alred for the invitation to

attend and speak at the WSSA Winter Rendezvous dinner on Saturday night (February 10th) in Winthrop, and to Ron Lind and Shannon Lawler for a job well done putting the event together. I believe everyone had a great time.

While there I had the opportunity to speak to those at the dinner and to hopefully shed some light on the snowmobile program. I heard multiple people discussing how the snowmobile registration fees are increasing next year. To make it clear, there has been no recommendation submitted for increasing the cost of registering snowmobiles. Yes, that idea has been discussed, among other options, for increased revenue, but no decision has been made and will not be made without feedback from the snowmobile community. Any changes to snowmobile registration fees will have to be approved by the state legislature as it is set in state statute and currently no change to legislation has been submitted. With that in mind the snowmobile program cannot keep doing business as usual as it is unsustainable. Without an increase in revenue expect to see reduced services in the coming seasons.

Snowmobile Registrations

The snowmobile registrations through February are listed below and as you can see, snowmobile registrations are currently down 2,910 from last year at this time. We need everyone to register their snowmobile and be sure to pass the word around.

Did you know when you registered your snowmobile this year the money will be spent on next winter's services? That's how your snowmobile program works. Unlike other government programs, this program works with funds that are IN the snowmobile account not what revenue is possibly projected. Much like your personal bank account, you can only spend what you have.

Polaris Grants

The Polaris TRAILS Grant program makes funds available to organizations in the United States and Canada to promote safe and responsible riding, support trail preservation and help protect the environment and natural resources that are a part of the off-road trail systems.

Funds can be used by organizations for off-road trail development and maintenance projects, safety and education initiatives, and other projects to increase and maintain land trail access.

Randy Bannor, Larry Bannor, Greg Sorenson and Dennis Nelson raised \$15,000 for ALS efforts that year. One year later, the annual event now called the Black Woods Blizzard Tour began.

For the Love of Oregon's Trails

Recently over 70 trails users from a variety of motorized and non-motorized trail groups were at the State Capitol speaking in support of trails and showed their support of the recreational immunity for the trail system.

The trails groups are seeking a fix to Oregon's recreational immunity law that provides clear protections for all landowners who open their lands to the public for recreation free of charge and that clearly applies to both improved and unimproved trails.

The trail users discussed the recreational immunity law with the elected members and several groups, including the Oregon State Snow-mobile Association, also spoke in favor of the proposed legislation in a committee hearing.

Electric Vehicles

A snail, the newest endangered species? The Fish and Wildlife Service has launched an in-depth study of whether a teensy-tiny snail that inhabits springs in a small slice of lithium-rich Nevada desert should enjoy federal protections under the Endangered Species Act.

The probe will consider effects tied to the massive Thacker Pass lithium mine near the Nevada - Oregon border, currently envisioned as a major source of the material that's a crucial component of electric vehicle (EV) batteries.





Following an initial assessment of a petition filed by the Western Water-

sheds Project, the agency announced a 12-month study on listing as a threatened or endangered species.

Jennifer Granholm, Department of Energy Secretary, stated the Biden administration is "very concerned" about U.S. reliance on China for critical minerals.

China's dominance in the world's critical minerals supply chain is "one of the pieces of the supply chain we're very concerned about in the United States," Granholm said at the International Energy Agency's 2024 Ministerial Meeting in Paris.

China produces approximately 60% of all rare earth elements, which are critical to alternative-energy technologies, such as electric vehicles.

Ford has shifted its electric vehicle strategy to concentrate on smaller, lower-priced EVs and electric work vehicles such as pickup trucks and full-size vans. Any EV larger than a Ford Escape "better be really functional or a work vehicle," according to Ford CEO Jim Farley.

Farley also said he sees EV battery prices coming down with more competition. The company, he said, may go with a common cylinder-shaped battery cell to leverage purchasing and get better prices. He also said Ford might do that with another automaker.

Ford's Model e, the electric vehicle unit, lost nearly \$5 billion before taxes last year. Farley wouldn't give a date for it to break even, but said any new EV built by the company has to make money within 12 months of its release.

In Case You Missed This...

Yellowstone National Park: During the week of February 5th, the National Park Service (NPS) and the Animal and Plant Health Inspection

Service moved 116 Yellowstone National Park bison to the Fort Peck Indian Reservation in Poplar, Montana. The Bison Conservation Transfer Program continues to make history, having relocated the largest number of live Yellowstone bison to American Indian Tribes in the world.



The bison transferred to the Fort Peck Indian

Reservation included 108 males, four females and four calves.

European Farmers Protest: Mirroring protests across Europe, thousands of farmers in Spain staged a second day of tractor demonstrations across the country, blocking highways to demand changes in European Union farming policies and measures to combat production cost hikes and severe drought.

The protests led to several main national highways being blocked. State news said that 1,000 tractors were heading slowly toward Barcelona's city center, causing major traffic jams on roads into the northeastern port capital of Spain's Catalonia region.

The protests, involving several thousand people on tractors and in other vehicles, have not been backed by Spain's three main farming organizations, which called for separate protests in the coming days.

There have been other protests in countries such as France, Poland and Greece in recent days. The European Commission, the EU's executive branch, has already made concessions to farmers over the last few weeks on environmental and aid rules, and this week decided to shelve plans to halve the use of pesticides and other dangerous products.

Ski-Doo's Grand Touring Electric snowmobiles debut in Colorado. That was the headline from a January news article. The author, a person familiar with snowmobiles, visited Grand Adventures outside of Winter Park and took one for a spin. Currently there are five locations in the U.S. where the machines are being rented/tested. What did he learn from his ride? The machines use a level-2 carstyle charger that can recharge in less than three hours. These snowmobiles are meant for short distances (about 30 miles) with a top speed of around 37 mph. They are quiet, claiming no louder than a washing machine. His final thoughts? The sled's speed and range limits will keep most riders, himself included, on traditional gas-powered snowmobiles for the foreseeable future. No surprise. If one was really serious about an electric snowmobile, I think Taiga is leading the pack in performance (speed and range) at the moment.

Polaris owners aren't out of the woods vet! Yep, fire danger still exists in recalled machines. Polaris recently posted a bulletin on their website stating the repairs previously issued did reduce the fires caused by static discharge, there have been eight more incident reports since the

recall repairs have been comowners to use E10 fuel with a 91 or higher octane rating. (This fuel prevents the electrostatic buildup according to Polaris.) There isn't a stop use/sale order as owners just need to switch fuels. Snowmobiles affected are 2021-2024 MA-TRYX models and 2015-2023 AXYS machines.

Snowmobiler went missing and nearly spent a deadly-cold night near the rim of Crater Lake. This happened in mid-February when the 38-year-old rider, on a rental machine, was separated from his group. He zigged when the group zagged and he rode several miles through the backcountry before getting stuck. Unable to free the machine, he managed a call to the local search and rescue before his phone died. He told them he didn't know where he was and that he wasn't dressed for the weather. Luckily he was found just before midnight, but in a hypothermic state. The temp was 19 degrees and a winter storm was approaching.

One can write this off to inexperience and lack of preparation... But are YOU prepared? Many snowmobilers brag on how they are equipped for avalanches with bags, probes, shovels and transceivers. But can they (you) make shelter and build a fire? I've ridden with lots of different groups and there has been a time or two where we can't find one of our members for a period of time. So far we always have found them after a brief search, but what happens if the weather turns, it gets dark, or something else hinders the group? Maybe practice those skills on the next group ride?.

ENVO. For all your electric snowsport needs! No, not really, but the British Columbia company does have a couple of cool products... prices notwithstanding.

First up is the SnowKart at about \$4,370. It's a twin-track/single ski machine billed as a "fun machine that won't hurt you". (Hmm, doesn't sound like a lot of fun...) But the design is cool;

reminds me of a snowmobile version of a Big Wheel and only weighs about 100 lbs. Turning is accomplished more with differing track



speeds than the handlebar-directed front ski; pull the left brake handle for left turns, right handle for right turns. The top speed is a blistering

12 mph... no wonder they advertise it as not being able to hurt you! I'm guessing some smart person can offer up a 'performance' speed controller to boost the top speed. Other (not so) newsworthy features include the ability to climb a 20-degree grade, ability to buy versions with differing



battery capacities with run times of two to three hours, and tow up to 400 lbs. Wait, that tow rating is impressive! Oh, and like an e-bike, the batteries are removable and can be brought in for charging, which takes from two to six hours based on size and state-of-charge.

Prefer something with one less track? Then check out their Flex Electric Snowbike. Not a



snowbike in the traditional sense, but more like a trackequipped electric mountain bike. But at \$2,872, it is actually pretty affordable.

WA Senate Bill 5831 - Permanent Registration of Vintage Snowmobiles. I covered this legislative effort last month. As for an update, I did a bill search to find the status and it appears the bill has died in committee for this go round

Snowmobile safety and Search and Res-

cue. The article started off talking about a recent snowmobile accident in Kittitas County near Cooper Lake. Two snowmobilers rode off a 50-foot embankment into a wooded area below and were injured. Another snowmobiler discovered them and was able to alert Search and Rescue via an emergency locater, and helped one of the riders back up to the trail. Kittitas County Search and Rescue and the Snoqualmie Pass Ski Patrol came in and retrieved the more seriously injured victim and she was airlifted out. The other ride was taken to the hospital via ground transport. It was reported they were a husband and wife, both 52vears-old, and from the Auburn area.

And then the article took a twist and noted the Kittitas County Search and Rescue Off-Road Vehicle (ORV) Team is looking for volunteers.

The Kittitas County Sherriff's Office (KCSO) says the mission of the KCSO ORV Team is to provide Search and Rescue coordinators and mission planners with an off road vehicle option that can negotiate terrain conventional vehicles cannot. The team provides search capability, search area containment, logistical and staging support, traffic control, transportation and more.






(Continued from page 31) a Polaris and have avoided the fires, now you need to think about the clutch taking your leg off! Okay, it probably isn't that dire, but a new recall on MATRYX models with 650 and 850 engines says the primary (drive) clutch can fail and the clutch and clutch components can come off the vehicle with a possible injury result. The recall looks to cover 2022 to 2024 models, so if you are an owner, check it out.

Hey Ski-Doo owners, quit snickering! A recall of certain 2024 Ski-Doos has just been issued as well. Seems sleds with Pilot X skis might suffer a failure. There have been 28 cases of the left ski breaking, but with only one injury so far. If by chance you own one of these machines, you are asked to park it and contact Ski-Doo.

A tragic accident near Leavenworth. In February a 51-year-old woman was killed and her 14-year-old female passenger suffered leg injuries in a snowmobile accident near the Eagle Creek Sno-Park. A snowmobile rental company reported the accident to the Chelan County Sheriff's Office. Emergency crews arrived on the scene around 2:45pm and began to treat the older victim who had significant chest and leg injuries but she died at the scene. It was reported the snowmobile had left the trail, went down an embankment, and under a tree, where the driver was struck in the chest. Both victims were reported as being from the Seattle area. I couldn't find reference as to whether these two were new riders on a rental machine, but it may very well be the case. Our hearts and prayers go out to the family and friends of individuals.

Is snowmobiling safe? Across the U.S. and Canada, there are too many news reports like the one above. That being said, I contend snowmobiling can be a very safe sport. But there are a lot of risks surrounding snowmobiling. Those in the West think of avalanches. But you are more likely to be killed or injured in some other kind of accident while snowmobiling. Going off the trail and hitting an object is probably at the top of the list. Snowmobiles, even older, less powerful ones, can get you into trouble with a handful of throttle and a distracted mind. Please keep that in mind when you ride, and more importantly, stress this to our younger riders and new beginners. What's the saying? "Make every trip and roundtrip."

Snowmobile Program funding issues; how about a bond? Sounds crazy to us here in Washington State, but that is exactly what snowmobile and ATV leaders are pushing for in the state of Maine. More than 500 of these leaders are asking the state legislatures to pass a \$30 million Maine Trails Bond. They want lawmakers to place this on the November ballot so Mainers have an opportunity to have their say. The article notes trail maintenance is usually paid for through fees paid by snowmobile and ATV club members, but recent storms have severely damaged the trails and it is too costly to cover. Since

Maine is very dependent on recreation tourism, the ask is for \$30 million in grants to be disbursed over a four year period. The money would go to organizations and towns to pay for construction, design and repairs on trails. It probably doesn't need mentioning there is opposition to this.


